

Here are some of the features we hope you'll use:

- 1. **RSVP online for meetings and workshops.** There will be a link to the RSVP form in the newsletter and on the website. No need to send an email or call someone. We'll still have a reservations volunteer who will answer questions or help with unusual situations. There will be a contact form if you need someone to call or email you.

- 4. <u>Announcements.</u> We'll list upcoming writers' conferences, contests, anthologies, and other opportunities writers need to know about. We'll also have a form you can fill out so you can let us know about something we haven't listed (may be subject to board approval).
- 5. **Helpful Editor.** If you'd like feedback from a professional editor on a few pages of your writing, Elisabeth Tuck offers this for members who attend a meeting. There will be instructions and a form online for you to submit your writing. Elisabeth will meet with you prior to the meeting (other than workshops), and give you feedback.
- 6. **Writers Tables.** We'll always let you know what's next for these popular pre-meeting craft discussions. If you want to lead a table, or have an idea for a topic, fill out the form to let us know.
- 7. **Find a Critique Group:** Use the online form to let us know what you're looking for (genre, size, location, etc.) and we'll work on finding you a group. Let us know if you are willing to host!
- 8. **Renew Membership Online.** Easier than the method we use on our current website. Click on the link to renew, give us your name and click the PayPal button. **Remember there's no fee for paying online!**

CWC and I by Al Garrotto

I knew about the Mt. Diablo Branch of CWC for some time before joining. In the 1980s I had commercially published a three-volume nonfiction work under the series title, *Adult-to-Adult* (Winston Press, Minneapolis, MN). Today, that title might sound sexy. Not then. The series was meant for Christian discussion groups. Since they sold well, I thought, "This writing/publishing thing is easy."

I still didn't think the series stamped my ticket as a "professional writer." To be a *real* writer I undertook the task of writing a *real* book, a . . . *drumroll* . . . novel. It took eight years of writing and editing to arrive at a finished product and secure a literary agent. More editing delays. Finally, the book sold to a mass-market paperback house in Canada.

Any writer who knows the thrill of ripping open a box and seeing the cover of that published book will identify with my gut response. There it was! *A Love Forbidden*. A novel. A real book. With my name on the cover. I don't mind telling you that I cried tears of authorial pride—and relief. I had finally met my own artificial standard for joining CWC.

I soon learned that, during those years of solitary labor, I would have benefitted greatly by association with a professional writing community. Such influence would have improved the quality of my writing. Just walking into the room for our monthly get-togethers, I am energized by the creative vibes electrifying the atmosphere. Dozens of novels and short stories buzz around inside the attendees, all in various drafts and phases of development and publication. Memoirs, biographies and, of course, the imaginings of talented poets in our midst further ratchet up the voltage. I always leave having experienced a revival of my own creative juices. Over the years, dozens of my professional colleagues in CWC Mt Diablo have also become dear and valued friends.

So, whenever I'm asked why I belong to the California Writers Club and faithfully attend almost every meeting . . . and why I have given back by serving two terms as president and still do as a board member, I reply with sincerity: "This is about the only place I can go every month where people understand the Writer-Me. When we converse about aspects of our creative calling, they know what I'm talking about." Every writer needs this kind of affirmation.



Note: To date, I have published 12 books and adapted three of my seven novels into screenplays, which I currently market on InkTip.com. My most recent book is The Soul of Art (nonfiction). Another nonfiction work-in-progress is grinding its way through a tortuous first draft.

A Love Forbidden is still available <u>free</u> on Smashwords.com, iBooks, and other online e-book sites, as well as on Amazon.com for \$0.99. It remains my "bestselling" book, after all these years!

Don't forget BUCK-A-BOOK at the Sept 9 meeting. This is a chance to donate gently used books you've read and enjoyed and put them out for other members to pick up for a buck donation to the branch. A Little Free Editing?

HELPFUL EDITOR – A professional editor will accept the first 5 members who email me two pages of their work, preferably (but not necessarily) the first pages of an article or book and I will edit (copy and contet editing) as comprehensively as possible. Beginnings are crucial to your readers, or if you're struggling with something, maybe I can help.. This will be a discussion group prior to monthly meetings (when the meeting is not a workshop or May's Young Writer Contest award banquet)

You MUST:

- -Follow all directions. (If you want to be published traditionally, win contests, or have anything accepted for publication, you must follow directions, so this is practice.)
- -Attend a meeting to receive the edits.
- -Be willing for me to discuss something I've noted that might be of interest to the others in the pre-meeting discussion group. If you are shy, let me know and I will not identify the author.

Email your submission 10 days in advance (or earlier) of a meeting you plan to attend (12 point double spaced with 1" margins, white paper, normal font)

Make sure you say which meeting you plan to attend--remember no workshops or YWC.

I will read the pages carefully before the meeting and mark them up, good points and bad.

Sign in to the meeting as close to 11:00 as possible.


Join the Helpful Editor table.

We'll talk about issues I may have seen in the pieces and I'll make suggestions.

You of course are free to ask questions.

If you have to miss the meeting, sign up to join a later month's group and get your edits at a later meeting.

I am not looking for clients. I just want to offer some help. Disclaimer: I'm not perfect. Even editors need editors—witness this newsletter which I don't have time to have edited as I usually do! I've read for the *Literary Review* for several years now. Mt. Diablo has a good track record of quality pieces being accepted. Let's continue that by learning all we can about writing well!

Report on the Tri-Valley Writers Conference

(Mt Diablo had a drawing for a free ticket to the Tri-Valley Writers Conference providing the attendee would write a report for us.)

Traversing the Tri-Valley Conference

A golden ticket to the Tri-Valley Writers Conference held on April 22nd in Pleasanton gave me the exciting opportunity to mingle with friends and learn from sessions in three categories: **Craft, Marketing**, and **Self-Publishing**.

Keynote speaker **Anne Perry**, the *New York Times* best-selling fiction author, was as personable as she is prolific. Can you imagine having over eighty-five novels published and none ever being out of print? In addition to her copious writing accomplishments, she connected with her audience on the platform and was quite easy to talk with in a one-on-one conversation.

I kicked off the day with a **Craft** panel on essential elements of writing, featuring our own Elizabeth Koehler-Pentacoff, author of ten books and hundreds of articles and essays; Victoria Zackheim, author and editor; and Anne Perry. Liz suggested giving your characters an obsession and when writing children's books, look for kid-like metaphors to hold the whole book together. Anne noted when writing mysteries, the mystery is not the main thing. Good ones explore moral, ethical, and social catastrophes and authors need to slowly untangle the threads connected to the central theme. Victoria's tip on memoir was to choose an issue, your focus, which you want to work through. For example, how do you feel about getting older, what gives you strength, or what do you believe?

In the **Marketing** session, Linda Lee, of Askmepc-Webdesign, discussed eight elements every website must have: book sales page, biography page, speaking/appearances, blog, call to action-email signup/ RSS feed sign up, sidebar help, social media links, and contact page. **Visit her website for free resources**: www.askmepc-webdesign.com/

After lunch, Anne Perry delivered her Keynote, "Put Your Heart on the Page." What does your character want and why does it matter that they get it? It has to make the reader care very, very much. For example, in her WWI series, she noted that everything changed radically for every person--those who went (like her chaplain Granddad), and those who stayed. She explored what could keep a man going through that experience—what did he believe? Maybe what gets us through horrendous experiences is like the soldiers in the trenches saying, "I won't leave you. I'll watch with you," or "I knew you'd come back; I knew you wouldn't leave us." It's universal.

Having your characters find the answers to impossible situations may put them in a moral dilemma, like is it okay to kill? If we don't, we might lose the war. Put your character in a moral dilemma and make the reader feel their excitement, hopelessness, sense of victory, exhaustion. Make your research accurate and peculiar to time and place. For example in WWI trenches, what did the soil feel and smell like?

Anne recommended getting your passion down in the first draft: injustices, a cause, a passion, then add humor. A reader can live hundreds of lives through good books. Make your reader say, "I felt I wasn't alone because you watched with me through that patch."

After the keynote, **Jim Azevedo, Smashwords'** marketing director led an interactive session on **Self-Publishing**. If your goal is to be known and get readers, he suggested offering your book free. Get readers then turn them into fans then super fans. Pricing impacts unit sales. To get the most downloads for fiction, he advised charging \$0.99, \$2.99, or \$3.99, but not \$1.99. It's a black hole and doesn't sell. Non-fiction is priced at \$5.99 through \$9.99. Readers want to solve a problem and are willing to pay for it. **For free downloads, including "The Secrets to Ebook Publishing Success," check out www.Smashwords.com**.

Finally, to wrap the day, I chose the **Craft** session on writing a compelling personal essay (200 to 6,000 words) or memoir with Anne Perry and Victoria Zackman. You need a theme, for example, equality or faith. The purpose is to examine yourself in painful honesty. What are your emotional reactions? Are you feeling hurt, betrayed by friends, anxious, disillusioned, or frightened? Or is it a time of great joy like the moment you discovered you were pregnant after 15 years of trying? Write your response as a human being versus describing the event. Be sure to ask yourself, "How will I feel having strangers read it? What will it do to my relationships?"

Arc elements to include are: how did you grow and change during the story? You're not the same person on the first and last pages. What did you learn? Like other stories, you need to focus on conflict, how it arose, and how it is resolved. Anne feels that internal conflict is best—the two sides of self.

This was a great conference. I left with added insight, knowledge, and motivation.

Belinda (Bee) Hylinski, Mt. Diablo vice president 2011-2013 July 23, 1941 - August 3, 2017

Belinda "Bee" Hylinski passed away peacefully at home on August 3, 2017. Bee was raised in New Canaan, CT. She graduated from Vassar College. Later she moved to the Bay Area where, in 1979, she earned her law degree. She practiced estate planning and tax law in Walnut Creek for many years and was a former mayor of Moraga. Her many interests included world travel, singing, baseball, writing, jewelry making, and golf. She was an active member of many organizations and clubs. Mostly, Bee loved spending time with her grandchildren. She is survived by her husband Ralph, brother Ned, daughter Ginger, son-in-law Cliff, two grandchildren, and a host of friends. All who knew Bee are invited to attend a memorial service on Saturday, August 26, 2017 at 10:00 A.M. at St. Stephen's Episcopal

Church, 66 St. Stephens Drive in Orinda, California.

ALAMO — Bee Hylinski's love affair with the Oakland Athletics began in her early teens in Kansas City when the team was known as the Kansas City Athletics. Bee wore a skirt, a shirt with a Peter Pan collar, and Mary Jane shoes with white socks. The fans dressed stylishly.

"I fell madly in love with (pitcher) Art Ditmar. Fans were incredibly enthusiastic for the A's."

Bee attended more than 30 games that baseball season. But it took decades before she rekindled her love affair with the Oakland Athletics in 1988 when she became a season-ticket holder. Her passion for the game resulted in her novel, *Contract Year: A Baseball Novel*, which she describes as "a labor of love for the game of baseball." The novel centers on a young, major league pitcher, Larry Gordon, who had everything going for him — until his world started to unravel. Bee channeled former A's (and now Giants) pitcher Barry Zito as inspiration for her novel's protagonist.

Hylinski, who lives in Alamo, taught art classes through Walnut Creek Civic Arts Education and showed her work as a fiber artist. But having hand surgery prevented her from creating the intricate detail work necessary.

In the summer of 2005, she attended the Oakland Feather River Art Camp near Quincy to focus on creating gourds. Instead, she was drawn to a writing workshop taught by Oakland writing teacher Clive Matson.

"He had the participants write a piece of flash fiction," Hylinski said. "We wrote about what we know and what we're passionate about, so I created the Larry Gordon character."

Matson thought Bee could stretch the piece into a novel. Eventually she wrote the first chapter, and by the end of chapter three, she was hooked by her story.

"I did make an outline, but Larry didn't want to follow my outline," she said. "I was trying to make Larry do something that was not in his character and wasn't something he would do. So I listened to him. I didn't have writer's block because I listened to Larry and thought, 'What would Larry do in this situation?'"

Bee researched Major League Baseball players and obtained permission to interview A's minor league pitchers from the Arizona Fall League to get a sense of the young players' demeanor and use of contemporary colloquialisms.

"The important ingredient was Bee's enthusiasm for baseball," Matson said. "The enthusiasm for the story was already brewing in her."
