



She runs a successful business as a coach and consultant for authors and has presented in Italy, Boston, Washington D.C., Seattle, and Los Angeles.
Apr 14	Dean Gloster "Writing Humor"	Dean is a former law clerk to two U.S. Supreme Court Justices and a former stand-up comedian. In winter, he ski races. Her debut novel, <i>Under the Never Sky</i> , was released in January 2012 and deemed one of the Best Books of Year by School Library Journal. June 9	Brooke Warner She Writes Press	Brooke Warner gave a TED talk on June 22, 2017. She is a publisher of She Writes Press, president of Warner Coaching Inc., author of <i>What's Your Book?</i> and <i>How to Sell Your Memoir</i> , and co-author of <i>Breaking Ground on Your Memoir</i> . She is also a regular Huffington Post blogger and a master teacher of memoir who co-leads the popular course "Write Your Memoir in Six Months." Her expertise is in traditional and new publishing. She sits on the boards of the Independent Book Publishers Association, the National Association of Memoir Writers, and the Bay Area Book Festival. Her website has been named by The Write Life as one of the Top 100 Best Websites for Writers.
