

Botswana camp manager (Kago) cracked up for no reason.









Do you have any tips for writers going on future trips to research their writing?

# Before the trip:

- ▶ Plan ahead
- Before leaving, know what you don't know
- ► Imagine what you will (or hope to) learn on the trip
- ➤ Set up as many stops as possible before you leave, including how long you think each activity will take— then double that time

# During the trip:

- ► Have fun and roll with all the things that might go less-than-perfectly
- ► Indulge all of your senses
- Buy stuff pertinent to your writing
- Keep a daily log & jot down unclear points
- ► Talk with everyone; ask tons of questions
- Get as much contact information as you can



Sensory detail & your writing:

The water is crystal clear.

But please tell me, what color is it?!

#### Some facts:

- > Small ship
- Many people
- Months on board
- Head is in the bow

Wait, what?

Why not the stern?!





Whenever you can,

do what your characters do/did.

I now know how heavy the helmets are!

Yep! That's part of the way up the mountain to Azuchi Castle.

Your characters walked it.

Now, when you've done it, you'll know exactly what it was like.



# After the trip:

- Send thank you notes to everyone who helped
- Review your daily logs—relive the trip
- ► Make sure you have all your open questions in one place: you do want answers eventually!
- Enjoy the stuff you bought
- ▶ Get back to writing!!



# QUESTION #4: JILL HEDGECOCK

- × Keep a journal. Record everything, sights, sounds, smells.
- Take lots of photos and videos.
- If allowed, use your voice memo to record tour guide information (but confirm the information when you get home).
- Listen for dialect. "Remember."
- Ask people about their culture.
- Fellow tourists. (Twitcher).

× Pay attention to details. Closeup and angles.



### QUESTION #4: JILL HEDGECOCK (CONT.)

Don't forget big picture (landscapes). It's easy to get caught up in the tourist highlights.
