B Lynn Goodwin

Approximately how long have you been a CWC member and why did you join? I've been a member for at least 25 years—I think. You were meeting in a restaurant in Concord, which changed hands and later was torn down. I originally joined because I wanted to know more about writing and get to know some authors.



CWC: How has your CWC membership helped you or your writing?

I was in a great critique group with several members. We used to meet at Marie Callender's. I've learned from the speakers, and gain perspective on the various reasons people write and the way they pick their topics.

Do you have published works?

Yes. That's the short answer. The second edition of *Talent* (Koehler Books) was released early in November 2020. My memoir, *Never Too Late: From Wannabe to Wife at 62* (Koehler Books) won a National Indie Excellence Award, a Human Relations Indie Book Award, and a Pinnacle Book Award as well an Honorable Mention in other contests. My flash fiction has been published in *Nebo*, *Cabinet of Heed, Murmur of Words, Flashquake*, and *100 Word Stories*. Other short works have appeared in Hip Mama, The Sun, GoodHousekeeping.com, PurpleClover.com, Dramatics Magazine and in assorted regional publications.

B Lynn Goodwin

I did an earlier book called *You Want Me to Do WHAT? Journaling for Caregivers*. My e-zine, Writer Advice, has been around since 1997.

What are you currently working on?

I'm editing a sequel to *Talent*. The title is still a work in progress though it might be called Uncharted Territory. I'm also reading submissions for Writer Advice's Scintillating Starts Contest, www.writeradvice.com, and doing some editing for three different clients.

Who or what has influenced you the most as a writer?

It might be a writing program called Amherst Writers and Artists. By using positive affirmations in response to raw writing, they gave me a lot of criticism.

What part of the writing process is most difficult for you?

Sometimes it's hard to get started. Or stay organized, or find the perfect words or make them sing.

Are there any resources, tools, or events that you have found especially helpful for writing or publishing? My two most useful tools are my brain and my laptop. And of course my fingers.

Do you have any advice for new writers?

Appreciate the journey. Give yourself permission to write daily and go wherever the writing takes you. Remember, there are no mistakes, other than typos. All the rest of your glitches just might be new material.

How will you find a publisher?

My current publisher is Koehler Books, https://www.koehlerbooks.com. When I submitted a memoir, *Never Too Late: From Wannabe to Wife at 62*, it went to an acquisitions editor who already knew my work. She'd been a finalist in one of Writer Advice's Flash Fiction Contests. She doesn't like memoir, but she had never read anything like mine and told the owner of the company they *had* to publish the book. Before that I had two publishers who went out of business. Rereading this, it sounds improbable, but you can't make this stuff up.

How have your background, previous work, and/or experience contributed to your writing?

I taught English and drama to high school and college students. They and my imagination gave me lots of material for *Talent*. *Never Too Late* is about a man I met on ... ahem ... Craigslist. He was a business owner, pastor, and the widowed father of seven adults who knew what he wanted. So did I, I thought. I'd never met anyone like him, and marriage at 62 can bring up a lot of issues. *You Want Me to Do WHAT? Journaling for Caregivers* gives prompts for caregivers or anyone who feels like he or she needs to journal. I was my mom's "assistant" for the last six years of her life. It's only available in flip-book format, though several companies have offered to republish—for a price—not that there's necessarily anything wrong with that.

What do you like about writing?

I love the moment when the writing flows and I'm making discoveries as I type.

What are your future writing goals?

Keep writing, keep doing all kinds of editing, keep adding to my journals, and see how the new normal alters the writing and publishing universe.

Be Interviewed

How has your CWC membership helped you or your writing? Each meeting, (when we can be there in person) I meet people whose writing experience and subject matter expertise give me great insights. Of course the speakers are great too, but I can count on my tablemates to always leave me better informed.



Do you have published works? I have 5 books out - 4 self-help (3 on careers and 1 on retirement) and a novel about the Firestorm in 1991. I also have a variety of magazine credits - technical journals, national slicks, etc. Recently, I placed in a short story contest and had an edgy story published in a book. And though it's never attributed, some of the material you might read on software websites was authored by me.

What are you currently working on? I was writing another Savvy series book about savvy traveling. Covid-19 put that on hold. I'm also venturing into mystery with a book set at Rossmoor.

Who or what has influenced you the most as a writer? Since I could write, I have written with support by my mother (and a genetic gift from my Dad,) as well some of my high school English teachers were very supportive and provided me critical reviews. But one key factor - In English 1A at Cal, the professor had us write just one paper, but we could keep submitting it and being critiqued. Mostly, you don't learn to edit and that was powerful for me.

What part of the writing process is most difficult for you? Not the writing - the marketing. Even as I have done marketing as one of my professions, the kind you have to do for books isn't my forte. I find the changing algorithms on Amazon challenging to deal with, and most techniques I've tried haven't worked all that well. Most advice seems to be more targeted toward fiction. It's just a challenge to get visibility for your work.

Are there any resources, tools, or events that you have found especially helpful for writing or publishing? I used to love the CWC annual conferences. These conferences (and others) are an intense dive into your writing with powerful learning as well as a chance to engage with agents and other writers. A very good investment of time.

Do you have advice for new writers? Use every single writing opportunity as a chance to grow your skills. The 10,000 hour thing is real. As a marketing professional in the software industry, I had to write a ton of material. I used every assignment as a writing exercise and had colleagues critique my work, so I could improve. Don't forget emails - everything you write can make you a better writer. I write all the time and practice means progress.

How will you find a publisher? I have had two agents - amazingly weird stories about that. But as I started writing self-help, I wanted to get the books to my friends and colleagues faster, so I published them on my own. Saves a ton of time.



How have your background, previous work, and/or experience contributed to your writing? I've always written, but having to write at work gives you such a great opportunity to keep getting better. I also find that my extensive speaking experience helps me. By really knowing how to communicate with audiences, you can do a better job with dialogue.

What do you like about writing? Creating something new. Even though it is said that there are no new stories, there's always a new slant and viewpoint you can apply. For short work, a lot of writing is done in my head before I sit down, and when I print it out and read it, it just feels like success. Once in a while, I have a chance to hear from a reader that what I wrote really made a difference in their lives. That's success to me.

What are your future writing goals? I would like to be able to reach more people (the marketing challenge.) Especially with my non-fiction, I know that what I've written can make a difference to people. As a coach, I've helped a lot of people find a job they love, but one-on-one, I can't reach as many. With my books, people can self-coach their way to success.

In an arms merchant's house; Sakai, Japan

Such were the orders given to Watanabe Mariko. As much as she and her brother had prayed against it, Mariko was pregnant. She gave birth at sunrise on May 17, 1577. A boy child. By mid-morning, a nanny from a Nagasaki family arrived to help with the transport of the infant. Mariko was glad to be rid of it, even if only for periodic respites.

She pressed her neck on the hard, barley-seed pillow. The husks crunched against each other. *The gods tease me. That sound is like my mind and soul right now.* She detested the birth. She felt she had been raped twice. First by the Spanish and then when her lord had forbidden her *seppuku*, the ritual suicide which would have restored her honor. Her situation had been made worse by her lord forcing her to finish the pregnancy. At the same time, she was honored to be able to serve the empire--as strange and misbegotten, in her mind at least, that service was.

Apparently he was also a lusty one and, in addition to his wife, already had three mistresses, each with her own suite of rooms and gardens in the sprawling villa. *Each one dropping babies as if it was a horse race. Not that she cared.

Even her brother, Nobuhide, had weighed in with friendly and quite insightful advice. During her labor, he had said, "If Lord Oda honors it, at least do not dishonor it." She had almost forgotten his words because she had so concentrated on ensuring that not a single scream of pain would escape her lips. She was immensely satisfied that no whimper had. *Not even when its head shoved its way out*.

I couldn't have been more surprised if the turkeys had dropped from the sky.


