#### What do you like about writing?

Writing is like starting with a piece of clay that I shape and mold until I eventually create something appealing and intriguing. It starts out as a blob and becomes recognizable. Writing also helps me explore possibilities, continue traveling on paper and document milestones.



# Be Interviewed (cont'd)

#### What part of the writing process is most difficult for you?

Getting to the chair and keeping myself in my seat. I'm easily distracted and tend to prioritize dusting, vacuuming, helping my son with his homework, and any other chore before creative writing.

#### Are there any resources, tools, or events that you have found especially helpful for writing or publishing?

The Writing Salon in Berkeley offers a class called "The Round Robin" that I've taken several times to generate a critical mass of content. Each Sunday, for six weeks, participants receive writing prompts for the upcoming week and an exchange partner. A sample prompt might be "apple" or "I haven't forgotten." Participants are expected to commit to the class for 20–30 minutes each day, with 10–12 of those minutes going toward their own writing and the other 10–20 minutes commenting on their partner's work. It's a great way to stay disciplined and generate new material.

#### What are you currently working on?

A memoir of my experience living in Paris and the South of France. While my other 30-year-old friends were growing their careers, getting married and starting to have kids, I quit my job, moved to Paris to be with my boyfriend, split up with him and decided to stay, despite being broke with no working papers and no job prospects. Down and out but determined to make it on my own, like Mary Tyler Moore, these are stories about my journey weathering French customs and incidents with mediocre French.

#### Who or what has influenced you the most as a writer?

Good writers inspire me with their use of language and research. Some of my favorites include Thomas Hardy, Marcel Pagnol, Andrea Camillieri, Ruth Rendell, Elizabeth George, Amor Towles, and Donna Leon. Bad writers also inspire me by their confidence and by the fact that they can get published. My mother-in-law is a published author and I admire that she was able to write while raising a family of five.

#### How have your background, previous work, and/or experience contributed to your writing?

I've always been a voracious reader and writing is an extension of my love of the written word. Travel has been a huge part of my adult life and those experiences fuel my writing as well.

#### Approximately how long have you been a CWC member?

Four months.

#### How has your CWC membership helped you or your writing?

Not yet but I imagine it will.

#### Do you have published works?

I have published a few short pieces and read them on KQED radio. I need to hunker down and market what I have in stock.

#### Do you have any advice for new writers?

Be curious. Write when it's hard and keep going.

#### How do you define success as a writer?

Success for me would be getting essays and my memoir published.

#### What are your future writing goals?

My biggest goal this year is to finish my book.

#### "THE DRONE"

Fiction by Robert Poirier

It was the ideal gig for Charlotte Baker. She had completed her last course, a 3.0 unit elective toward a Drone Studies Program certificate, for a Santa Rosa Junior College (SRJC) Associates Degree in Water Treatment and would start a similar program under the GI Bill at UC Davis in a month.

Charlotte had noticed a TikTok challenge to use high-volume, fifty-inch long river boards to river surf the Feather River south of the Oroville Dam on the next scheduled water release. The release would increase water flow from 2,500 cubic feet per second (cfs) to 10,000 cfs.

Charlotte convinced her faculty advisor, a retired State Water Project executive, to hire Charlotte to use a drone and patrol a five-mile section of the Feather River where it passed through the Lake of the Woods State Wildlife Area between Highway 99 and Highway 70. This area was the beginning of the California Aqueduct that supplied water to the rest of the state. She would alert the State Water Project emergency contact number if she noticed anything unusual.

Her budget for the assignment included enough money to select two late-model DJI quadcopter drones with a seven-mile range, thirty-minute flight time, high-definition zoom cameras, and spotlights. She named the drones Alpha and Bravo.

Alpha was on the third sweep, just at dusk, when Charlotte spotted unusual activity on the same bank of the river, about a mile downstream from her position. She

set Alpha to quiet mode, brought it back to the spot, and engaged the close-up feature. A man was standing, head bowed, holding a shovel, a few feet above a large, freshly dug hole a few yards up from the riverbank. She watched him make the sign of the cross, move a couple of paces to his right, and repeat the *signum crucis*. He then turned back to the hole where she saw what looked like a garbage-bag wrapped body.

She quickly set Alpha to return-to-home mode. The digger, who must have seen the drone in his peripheral vision, drew a small semi-automatic pistol and fired several rounds at it. A shot nicked a blade, and Alpha wobbled and crashed about a third of the way to Charlotte's position, just below the trees on the boulder-strewn hillside.

The digger followed the drone's path, spotted Charlotte, and started towards her. Alpha, which now had a video recording of the digger on a SanDisk 128GB memory card, also had a label with Charlotte's name, address, and phone number. A few seconds after the digger fired, Charlotte started down the embankment but quickly realized she could not get to the drone and back to her position before the digger would be within firing range.

"Sometimes the only way out is through," her US Marine squad leader used to say. She stayed and used the drones as weapons.

Charlotte launched Bravo but had lost sight of the digger in the near darkness. She circled Bravo around the area where she had seen him last, spotting him a few yards from Alpha. She hovered Bravo and zoomed the camera in for a close-up. The digger reached for his pistol again, but she jerked the control joystick, and the drone accelerated away from him before he could fire. The digger followed Bravo's flight for a moment, then reached into his backpack and pulled out what Charlotte realized were military-grade, night-vision goggles. He continued up the embankment towards Alpha.

She monitored the man's movements as she hovered Bravo out of pistol range until the digger reached Alpha. When the man picked up Alpha and turned it over to read the label, she started Alpha at maximum throttle. The drone quadcopter blades ripped into the digger's face. He screamed, flung the drone away from him, and stumbled backward down the embankment.

She returned Bravo home for a battery change then called the State Water Project emergency contact number to report the sighting. The call went to voice mail. She left a message with the exact GPS coordinates then called 911, giving the operator the same information.

A few minutes later, she heard a noise to the right and above.

Damn, I let him outflank me.

She launched Bravo and sent it circling the area until she spotted the digger holding the damaged night-vision goggles against his face. She disabled Bravo's obstacle avoidance feature, turned on the spotlight, and sent the 1.25-pound drone at maximum speed toward him. The spotlight blinded the man, who tore off the goggles just in time for the quadcopter blades to catch him full in the face. He screamed, fell to his knees, and raised his arms.

"I quit," he cried. "I can't see. Please, no more."

"Face down," Charlotte yelled. "Don't move. Keep your hands where I can see them."

"Okay, okay," he whimpered. "Thank you. I have tried to quit, but the voices kept telling me I had to continue. I'm not a monster."

"Whatever," she said dismissively. "Don't move your hands, or I'll bang you with one of these rocks."

"Please, I have an older dog at my house," he continued. "She hasn't done anything wrong, but they will probably put her down. If I okay it with the police, could you take care of her? I can have my lawyer pay you."

"Okay," Charlotte said. "Just don't move."

The California Highway Patrol arrived fifteen minutes later and took the digger into custody.

"I'll confess to everything," the digger said. "Just let the girl take care of my dog."

During her interview with a CHP detective, Charlotte mentioned there might be more bodies on the hillside. The detective called for a forensic team and cadaver dogs. The dogs alerted to three additional gravesites.

Charlotte received a \$50,000 reward for the arrest and capture of the digger who had kidnapped and killed all four victims. In addition, the water district awarded her a full-ride scholarship to UC Davis and promised her a job after graduating. The drone manufacturer asked her to be a part-time spokesperson while she attended the university.




The digger, who recovered the use of one eye, hung himself in his jail cell a few weeks after his capture. A few days later, an attorney contacted her. The digger had left her \$25,000 and his small cottage in Davis. Charlotte lived in the cottage with the dog until she graduated.

#### JOHN GRISHAM'S BOOK SOOLEY

Because John Grisham is best known for his legal thrillers, I was curious as to how he would approach a novel about a basketball player. I was quickly drawn into this fast moving, fictional story about a young man from South Sudan who comes to the attention of an NBA talent scout. <u>Sooley</u>, John Grisham's latest fiction novel, was published in 2021 by Doubleday.



The story begins as twenty local basketball players from around South Sudan gather at the University of Juba gym to try out for Coach Lam's Under 18 national team.

The players have been sent by secondary schools because of their interest and talent in the sport. Five players will be selected to travel to America and play on the team. Coach Lam selects Samuel Sooleymon because of his raw talent, determination, and drive. He is also 6' 2" and still growing at seventeen. The coach is from South Sudan himself and feels that basketball can make a difference in the lives of these young South Sudanese players.

During the basketball tournaments in Florida, Coach Lam receives a phone call from South Sudan with the news that Samuel's village has been ambushed by rebel soldiers. During the attack, Samuel's father was killed and his sister is now missing. Samuel is unable to return to South Sudan and accepts a scholarship to North Carolina Central, a college with a mediocre basketball team. Sooley, as he is affectionately called, becomes the star player. His underlying focus is to help his mother and two brothers leave the refugee camps in Uganda and immigrate to America. The story becomes a tale of the underdog overcoming unbelievable odds to achieve his dreams.

The characters are well-developed and drive the story. I was able to follow the growth of Sooley's skills through the graphic descriptions of the basketball game narratives and also follow his relationships off the court with his fellow teammates and coaches.

There is a twist in the plot at the end of the story that was unexpected and brings Sooley's career to an abrupt end. A new character is introduced and forms a brief relationship with Sooley. This new character, unfortunately, is not developed, and this leaves for the reader unanswered questions. I was caught off guard.

I recommend this novel for its character development and its vivid descriptions of the basketball game. I could not put the book down. It's a good read.

#### CWC BackFence Discussion Board Moves to Facebook

The CWC BackFence online Yahoo discussion group was originally established in 2006 for Mt. Diablo branch members to seek help from fellow writers, ask or discuss writing-related questions, and share news. Participation was expanded in 2010 to include Tri-Valley and Berkeley branch CWC members also. The motto of the BackFence is *Members Helping Members*.

# Reminder About Legally Downloadable Books from a 2019 article

Starting at midnight on January 1, 2019 tens of thousands of books (as well as movies, songs, and cartoons) entered the public domain, meaning that people can download, share, or repurpose these works for free and without retribution under US copyright law.

Per the Sonny Bono Copyright Term Extension Act of 1998, "corporate" creations (like Mickey Mouse) can be restricted under copyright law for 120 years. But per an amendment to the act, works published between 1923 and 1977 can enter the public domain 95 years after their publication.

The year 2019 marked the first time books published in 1923—including by Virginia Woolf, Agatha Christie, and Robert Frost—became legally downloadable since digital books appeared.

So, how do you actually download these books?

It depends on the site. Try several. For instance, ReadPrint.com, The Literature Network\_(mostly major authors), <u>Librivox</u> (audio books), <u>Authorama</u> (all in the public domain), and over a dozen other sites all have vast selections of free ebooks.

There are also a handful of archiving projects that are doing extensive work to digitize journals, music, and other forms of media. A blog post from Duke University's Center for the Study of the Public Domain listed some of the most recognizable works published in 1923, as well as links to download these books on digital archiving projects Internet Archive, HathiTrust, and the Gutenberg Project (<a href="https://www.gutenberg.org/">https://www.gutenberg.org/</a>). For example:

- Robert Frost, New Hampshire

- D.H. Lawrence, Kangaroo
- Bertrand and Dora Russell, *The Prospects of Industrial Civilization*
- Carl Sandburg, Rootabaga Pigeons
- Edith Wharton, A Son at the Front
- P.G. Wodehouse, *The Inimitable Jeeves* and *Leave it to Psmith*
- Virginia Woolf, Jacob's Room
- E.E. Cummings, *Tulips and Chimneys*

HathiTrust, has uploaded more than 53,000 works published in 1923. Over 17,650 of them are written in English. Similarly, Internet Archive has uploaded over 15,000.

Project Gutenberg has over 58,000 free downloadable books.

For academic papers, Reddit user nemobis uploaded over 1.5 million PDF files of works published in academic journals before 1923. To find something it will be easier if you know which academic paper you're looking for and check the paper's DOI number (Digital Object Identifier.) Then search for the DOI in one of nemobis's lists—one list includes works published until 1909, the other includes works published until 1923.

Most of the organizations mentioned rely on volunteer efforts, so they differ in the number of books available for download.

## **Judging**

Chloe Laube is our Judging Coordinator, and she'll be pestering... er... chatting with members in the next month or two, to see who wants to read and judge the entries. Sometimes there's a waiting list since previous judges always want to return, so get your name on the list.

If you are new to judging, don't worry – we'll train you. Our judges work in teams for each category/grade, so you won't be on your own. Categories are **Poetry**, **Short Story**, **Personal Narrative**, and **Humor**.

**When:** The judging period is April 1 - 15, 2022.

**Time to complete:** Depends on the number of submissions received. This is rarely more than 30 pieces in any given category/grade.

#### **Administrative Tasks**

Once the winners are chosen, we need help with preparing materials for the Awards Ceremony in May.

#### Tasks

- 1. Creation and printing of certificates for winners (1 hour)
- 2. Printing of envelopes for winners to hold cash prize (30 minutes)
- 3. Creation and printing of certificates and envelopes for Honorable Mentions (1 hour)
- **4.** Assembly of Awards Packets and mailing of Honorable Mention certificates this can be a group effort (3 hours)



Keep in mind that branch meetings happen throughout the month and postings on any given day will not include all 22 branches' speaker meetings for that month.



#### Volunteer to lead a Writers Table




