When I was in school, a few years ago, I caused my mother much heartache. I wasn't the stellar student that she hoped I would be. In subjects like English Language and English Literature, I was particularly incompetent. That is not an unjustified self-criticism – it was my reality.

As a part of each week's homework assignments, we had to write a two page composition. Recognizing my lack of ability, I scribbled down two pages of unstructured nonsense before I left the classroom to save me having to do it at

home where my mother may look at it. However the consistent end of term report cards indicated a major problem.

I received one compliment from one English teacher after reviewing one of my compositions. He had asked us to write about "Moving House." While everyone else wrote about packing boxes and loading trucks, I discussed jacking the entire structure off its foundations, putting it on a large trailer, and moving it down the road. My teacher said it was poorly written, but it had a novel view of the subject.

After I had failed my college entrance English examination twice, my parents sent me to a tutor. He was appalled at my inability to form consistent simple sentence structures. For three months, he had me read Edward Gibbon's *The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire*. If there was ever a book that would drive anyone away from ever reading another word, this was it. However, it did teach me to form sentences.

I did pass that exam on my third attempt with the lowest passing grade instead of my previous lowest possible failing grades.

Now, look what has occurred after some 65 years, I'm writing this message. It may not be the most eloquent or well phrased piece, but I can get the point across. And that is, believe in yourself. Don't listen to that doubting voice because it only knows the past. Look to the future and what potentially will flow onto the page that you will stare at before giving voice to a new idea.



National Poetry Month: How will you Celebrate?

In April 2023, as in previous years, starting on the 1st we will celebrate National Poetry Month.

Why do we celebrate poetry? On the heels of the success of Black History Month and Women's History Month, the Academy of American Poets, along with teachers, publishers, booksellers, and literary groups, decided it was time to celebrate poetry in a month-long awareness campaign.

This effort would not only serve to appreciate poetry in a greater way, but would increase readership, attendance at various poetry events, and open new doors in the literary genre. Since its inception, National Poetry Month has done all of this and more.

The first National Poetry Month celebration was held in April 1996. Then-President Bill Clinton signed into history a proclamation that made National Poetry Month an annual event and permanent celebration of the art form. The signing of the proclamation solidified the importance of poetry to include its past and present poets to be recognized, as well paving the way for future poets and their diverse accomplishments.

In 2002, the academy held its first gala to raise funds to support National Poetry Month. It was called Poetry and the Creative Mind. Now it is a mainstay with various artists, scholars, and dignitaries who read their favorite poems.

You don't have to attend a gala hosted by Meryl Streep to celebrate the love of poetry. Officially or unofficially, you can simply write your own poetry, if you don't already do so. Other ways to celebrate are attending a reading of your favorite poet at a library or a writer's group.

Perhaps you can learn a new poetic form. Do you know what a kenning poem is? A kenning poem is a noun and verb or two nouns. These two-word phrases used instead of one, is called circumlocution or indirect speech. The most famous use of kennings shows up in the epic *Beowulf*.

Kennings are found in Anglo-Saxon and Norse Poetry. They are used to describe nature and mythology. In *Beowulf*, sky-candle is two words comprised of a base word and a determinant.

The base word is candle meaning light, heat and the determinant is location, the sky. Sky-candle is combination for "sun." More common kennings we use today are mind-reader, tree-hugger, fender bender or winter blanket.

Now that you know what kennings are, use some in your writing. Test your acuity and pen a poem to usher in National Poetry Month.

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Have You Had Difficulties Using PayPal When Registering for a Meeting?

You registered for our meeting, paid with PayPal, submitted the form, and received a confirmation email from us. Then you get to the meeting and find out your payment didn't go through and you need to pay at the door.

What's going on?

Or...

You fill out the form, choose PayPal, and submit the form, but you aren't taken to PayPal. You are taken back to our home page and later you receive a confirmation of your registration.

Are you registered or not?

Or...

You fill out the form, choose PayPal, and submit the form. You are taken to PayPal but you don't see the option to pay using your own card. You don't have a PayPal account, so how can you pay?

Why can't you add your own card number?

Here are the Answers

First, let me explain about the confirmations you get, even if the payment didn't work. The confirmations are sent automatically by the form software as soon as you submit the form. It only means we have your reservation. It does not tell us anything about your payment.

If we catch the error, we'll contact you. But we may not catch it in time. A way **you** can know if your payment did not go through, is to look for PayPal's confirmation telling you the payment has been made. **If you do not receive that notification, then your payment did not through.**

While these things happen to just a few of our members or guests, we wanted to know the answers, too. Was there something wrong with our PayPal code? So, I opened a support ticket with PayPal to find out what was wrong. We ran several tests, and they checked the code related to our PayPal Checkout system. None of our tests were able recreate the errors. The registration/payment system on our end is working as it should.

Well, darn. It would be easier to find a problem that the technical people could fix!

The technician working with me understood that this makes things difficult for our members. He offered a few things to try if you are having trouble using our PayPal option. I have listed his suggestions below. But first,

here is a tip from one our members who helped with testing:

"The "culprit" turned out to be a faulty modem, which ATT came out and replaced recently. So far, so good. We've not had any further trouble or issues with the new modem."

In my experience, internet companies rarely tell you it's time for an upgrade. You need to call them.

PayPal's Suggestions

If you are not being brought to PayPal after submitting the registration form:

- 1. Clear your internet browser's cache and cookies
- 2. Accept PayPal's website cookies if you haven't done so
- 3. Switch to a different internet browser
- 4. Restart your device and try again
- 5. Make sure your device is upgraded to the latest version, if applicable
- 6. Try using a different device

If you are taken to PayPal but cannot find where to enter your credit/debit card number:

Note: In all our tests, we were able to see the field for entering credit card number.

- 1. If you cannot see this field, try the steps above, with special attention to accepting PayPal's cookies. If you haven't done that yet, then there will be a box on the screen asking you to accept the cookies. It's possible the box covers the field.
- 2. Try scrolling down in the PayPal screen.

The Cilantro Project Part 1 by Robert Poirier



Eve, a female cougar, paused when she heard the crow cawing the warning. It was daybreak, and the woods were dappled with light.

"Did you hear," she chuffed.

"Yes," her partner Adam replied. "We have a couple of hours before they get here."

Eve pulled Seth, their six-month-old kitten, close to her so he could nurse. At six months and fifty pounds, the kitten's dark spots had almost faded away, but he would still nurse if Eve offered.

"We'll move on as soon as Seth finishes," Eve said.

Mike Janko's phone earpiece signaled when the cougars' GPS and VHS tracking collars were within a thousand yards. Janko, the lead tracker for the Cilantro Project, checked the load and operation of the M1911 .45 caliber pistol in his shoulder holster, then checked the operation of the Daninject JM Special dart gun. Each dart contained a five-to-one ratio of Ketamine Hydrochloride (KHCL) and Xylazine Hydrochloride (XHCL), with twice the recommended dosage for mountain lions of 100 to 140 pounds.

This JM Special model was fitted with a 49-inch rifled extension barrel giving the weapon an effective range of 85 yards. Janko carried a bandolier with six additional safety-capped, pre-dosed darts and two spare CO2 cartridges. He could reload a dart in 15 seconds.



EVEN WRITING A RECIPE can be a problem if you don't think it through. So what's the beef in the instructions below?
