



INTERVIEW

I met a journalist once at a dinner party. I told him I write short stories and novels. He said he'd always wanted to do the same, but he didn't think his ego could take the rejection. So he never did.

My ego can't take the rejection, either. But I do it anyway. It's the difference between him and me—the difference between true writers and others who try and give up.

Rejection is a weeding out process. Over time one will give up on writing if one doesn't learn to deal with it.

It's like the organic chemistry course in college. Some pre-med students will decide to go into another field.

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Member's Works (Cont'd)

How do I deal with it? I don't, really. A rejection, or what they say on Submittable, "declined," is just as crushing as ever. The only difference is, my recovery time is shorter now.

I have my strategies. Don't put all your eggs in one basket, I tell myself. Submit to several journals at the same time, so you always have something going, always have hope, as it were.

My other strategy— which I don't recommend to people who may be "borderline"— is to pretend I'm two people. One is the sensitive, easily injured person that I have to be to write a good story. The other one is the tough, callous businessman who works on my behalf when I'm not writing. The latter fellow takes my stories to critique groups, listens to the comments, and reports back to me. He is cool and objective; he doesn't get ruffled; because, after all, it's not his story. He's like my agent might be, if I had one. I don't.

This fellow handles the submissions, does the research, records the results. He isn't fazed by rejection, because, after all . . .

So after many years of writing and submitting my work, I have developed this system. How well does it work? Not very well.

You can run, but you can't hide.

It's a writer's life.

I'm a published short story writer. I divide my time between Oakland and Borrego Springs, Calif. I'm working on a short story collection and a historical mystery novel set in Los Angeles in 1914.

Two workshops will be offered for those who would like a refresher or who are unfamiliar with the concept of ekphrasis,

- Offer some sensory detail in your work
- Think about whether there is a theme involved as a point of focus
- Does the work tell a story, or does it have some enticing pull that provokes the imagination or tugs emotionally?
- What inspired you to write? Is this reflected in your written response?

Authors' written responses will be paired with and hung next to the relevant artwork.

Eligibility:

Artists interested in responding in writing to artwork, may do so by joining CWC Mt. Diablo Branch or Lamorinda Arts Council.

Authors interested in submitting artwork for consideration may join Lamorinda Art Alliance or Lamorinda Arts Council.

All participants must be members in good standing with the appropriate organization through that organization's calendar year which for CWC is June 30, 2024.

The Art Gallery at the Orinda Library has been reserved for the Ekphrasis Exhibition for **two months** this year.

There will be fifty-five (55) visual art pieces, each shown with the assigned author response, for a total of one hundred and ten (110) works. Space-permitting, individuals may choose to respond to more than a single piece of work. The first entry will cost \$20.00; additional entries \$10.00.

Tired of fighting the Battle of the Bulge, Sam finally went on a diet.




